Krista Serrano follows her dream in Toronto

Krista Serrano, originally from Mexico, arrived in New Brunswick in August 2016. Her participation in the program lasted two complete school years. She also obtained her high school diploma at the Polyvalente Louis-J.-Robichaud (Shediac). Her goal at the time was to stay in Canada and continue her studies at a university in Toronto.

"My dream is to become an actress. Since I was a little girl, I have wanted to become an actress and a musician. That's why I came to Canada, to discover opportunities," Krista said in June of 2018.

Today, Krista has made that dream come true. She still lives in Toronto where she graduated from the Toronto Film School.

"I really wanted to pursue my dream of being an actress. Today I feel that Toronto is really the place I want to be. I fell in love with the country," she says.



The pandemic, however, has diminished Krista's chances of getting a role as an actress. That is why she works part-time and pursues her studies in business administration at York University in Toronto.

As for her host family, André and Sylvie Goguen, she hopes to see them soon, when the travel restrictions ease.

"I stayed in touch. I text them often. We use Snapchat, where we have a group chat. I am also in contact with my host sister. I give them my news. I would like to go to New Brunswick to see them as soon as it is possible. »

Description: The school Louis-J.-Robichaud is named for the first Acadian who served as Premier of the province of New Brunswick from 1960 to 1969. It is an entrepreneurial community school located in the town of Shediac, a bilingual seaside community of 6 053 people, located fifteen minutes from the city of Moncton. Famous for its hospitality and known as the "Lobster Capital of the World", every year thousands of visitors flock to its sandy beaches and the warmest water in the Atlantic Ocean, north of the Carolinas.

There are walking and cycling trails, an arena, soccer and baseball fields, a golf course, bowling centre, tennis courts and a multifunctional centre.
